Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

It is just after Easter Sunday as I write this. I am keenly aware that it is my last Easter season with the FUPC family. D.R. and I are busy with our regular commitments and are also beginning to sort and pack our things at home. There is much to do! Knowing that the season of Easter means new growth, change, and even re-creation is meaningful to me as we prepare to enter a new chapter of our lives.

And yet, I am very much feeling torn. We have purchased a house in Centennial, Colorado. It is less than 10 minutes' drive from our daughter Tegan and her family and offers a nearby park and walking trail. It has everything we wanted in our retirement home. On one hand, we are excited about making a home there. Nevertheless, as we begin to pack boxes, we feel the sadness of leaving this place and the family we have here in the FUPC faith community. On the other hand, we know it is time to move into this next phase of our lives, closer to family and freer to spend time with more distant family. And I know, after the discernment of my sabbatical time, that I am ready to be Grandma rather than Pastor. Still, the transition is a difficult one for me.

Transitions often are. They are, I think, supposed to be. We are supposed to be aware of what we leave behind when we move on, as well as of the intentionality it takes to build something new. It's true for us as Christians, too, especially during this season when we are perhaps most aware that we are created anew in Christ. That means transition, too; it means sloughing off the old way of being in favor of a new way, a way more aligned with Christ's mission, more aligned with wild and intentional love for all of God's creation. We never quite get the hang of it, so it's good to be reminded each Easter that new life in Christ is something we can choose each day. To follow through on that choice, we need the awareness of the change we want to make and we need the intentionality to become that something new.


WORSHIP TIDBITS


CALLING ALL BAKERS!

Adults and Youth class (finally) focuses on The Wandering Mind

Whether we are trying to do a religious-based spiritual practice, or concentrate on a secular project, we all too frequently find ourselves distracted, unable to focus on the task at hand.

The Sunday Morning Class for Adults and Youth will spend a few weeks discussing the book *The Wandering Mind: What Medieval Monks Tell Us About Distraction* by Jamie Kreiner, a medieval history professor at the University of Georgia.

Reviewers in major publications have had much to say about this new book—for example: "In *The Wandering Mind*, Dr. Kreiner observes that the modern-day distraction epidemic has revived our interest in medieval monks" (male, female, solitary, cloistered, whoever), "those supposed paragons of concentration, as masters of self-control and calm."

"So many of us have half-done tasks on our to-do lists and half-read books on our bedside tables, scroll through Instagram while simultaneously semi-watching Netflix, and swipe between apps and tabs endlessly, from when we first open our eyes until we finally fall asleep." "All kinds of statistics depict our powers of concentration as depressingly withered."

"The monks inhabited a different world, but they too were deeply preoccupied by the problem of distraction." "Their monasteries were filled with people who wanted to focus on God but couldn't. As John of Dalyatha lamented, back in the eighth century, 'All I do is eat, sleep, drink, and be negligent.""

Dr. Kreiner's book "focuses on more than the past, and its implications demand our attention." Unfortunately she isn't "promising to cure anyone's screen addiction with ... one medieval trick." "She's offering commiseration, not solutions."

One final reviewer comments, "We inherited the monkish obsession with attention, and even inherited their moral judgments about the capacity, or failure, to concentrate. But most of us did not inherit their clarity about what is worthy of our concentration. Perhaps that is why one uncomfortable explanation for why so many aspects of modern life corrode our attention is that they do not merit it."

"The problem for those of us who don't live in monasteries but hope to make good use of our days is figuring out what might *The Wandering Mind* moves beyond the question of why the mind wanders to the more difficult, more beautiful question of where it should rest."

The hardcover book is available new from Amazon for \$15.50 (half price) or used for \$10. Used prices at dealers such as AbeBooks and Alibris are competitive (prices plus shipping). Sessions will be at 8:45 a.m. in the Session Room or on Zoom (via the same link as for the worship service).
