Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

This Sunday, we will continue our walk “On the Way with Jesus” to the Lake of Gennesaret, where Jesus will teach the people and, afterwards, will instruct Simon to lower his nets into the water for a miraculous catch of fish. And then he will tell Simon to look forward to “catching people” from now on. We will spend some time on Sunday talking about what that means—for Simon and for us.

As I write this, I am listening to President Biden's inaugural address, as I suggested last Sunday that we all do. He speaks of justice, truth and unity and suggests that we must be different in order to achieve these ends—different in the ways in which we think about one another and our world; different not only in the ways we treat each other but in our active reaching out, if you will, to catch each other. He talks about working toward “not power but possibilities,” about “opening our souls rather than hardening our hearts.” May we pray for and work toward these ends.

During the inaugural event, I was particularly taken with the young poet, Amanda Gorman. Below, I share a poem of hers, called “The Miracle of Morning.”

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.
