PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear FUPC Family and Friends,

As I write this, I am sitting in my hotel room in Billings, Montana, where I have come to preside at the wedding ceremony of Nicky Litherland and Thomas Martin. I flew into Bozeman and drove the two hours to Billings on a rather dreary, cloudy afternoon. It had snowed overnight and into the morning, and so the landscape was snowy. (Thankfully, the roads were clear and mostly dry.) What a drive! The landscape here is stunning. In many places along the highway, I was surrounded by mountains. Absolutely beautiful! I am already looking forward to driving through Montana again this summer, during my sabbatical. But I won't be driving along the interstate, but on state highways.

Our plan is to avoid those interstates in favor of state highways that will take us through small towns. It will not be one of those "get where you're going as fast as you can" drives, but a "mosey through small towns, take detours as the spirit leads, and don't spend more than about six hours driving each day" drives.

Here's a quick view at the itinerary D.R. and I will follow:

May 24 – My sabbatical time begins with a few days to finish preparations and get packed.

May 29 – We will depart Las Vegas, mosey along the highway for a couple of days, and end up in my hometown of Leavenworth, KS.

May 31 – June 2 – Spend a few days seeing family and friends and exploring my hometown in ways I never thought to when I was growing up. (For example, I've never been inside the local museum!)

June 3 – Depart for our mosey to Milwaukee, WI, where we will see our daughter Emily and her family and spend a couple of days in the city.

June 7 – Depart for our first long stay near Aztalan State Park in Wisconsin, where I will spend three weeks exploring and writing about the prairielands.

June 29 – Depart for a week-long mosey to the coast in southern Oregon (Gold Beach), where I will have the opportunity to explore and write about my experience on the seashore.

July 29 – Depart for another longish-mosey (five days) to a place high in the Colorado mountains outside of Buena Vista, where my exploration will be focused on the mountain landscape. During this time, we should have an opportunity to see Tegan, Rosalie, and Eloise.

August 25 – We'll leave the mountains; D.R. and I will go our separate ways for a week where we will each have time in silent retreat. I'll be on study leave to prepare to return to the pulpit. Then we'll spend a couple of days relaxing in Pagosa Springs before we head home to Las Vegas, where we'll have a few days to unpack and get settled back at home.

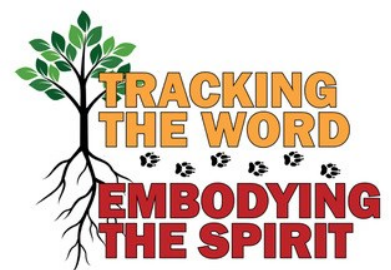
September 6 – I'll be back in the office. Keep an eye on the church calendar...Coffee with Katie that day? We'll see.

HOLY WEEK SERVICES



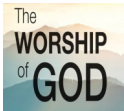

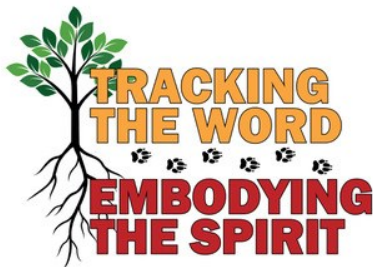
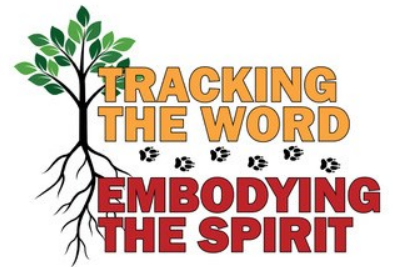
WORSHIP TIDBITS

Class To Discuss the Old Testament Twelve (Plus One)

After Easter, the Sunday morning class for adults and youth will be discussing the book *Daniel and the Twelve Prophets for Everyone* by John Goldingay. Sessions will run from April 16 through June 11, with a break for Memorial Day weekend on May 28.

The “minor prophets” are twelve Old Testament books, known simply as “the Twelve” or “the Book of the Twelve” in the Hebrew Bible. They are presented as separate books in the Christian Bible. “Minor” refers to length, not significance. Roughly in chronological order, each of these short books gives a glimpse into the spiritual landscape and history of Israel, challenging the status quo through prophets called to speak on God’s behalf.

Reviewer Comments: Goldingay is Professor of Old Testament at Fuller Theological Seminary and author of many commentaries on Old Testament Biblical books.

After a brief introduction of Daniel and the twelve prophetic books, Goldingay launches into his commentaries. He includes his own translations of the Biblical texts prior to each section of commentary. He claims that his translations align with the literal Hebrew more than other translations.

His pattern is to efficiently get to the heart of the matter in the commentaries and to elaborate on highlights he wants to emphasize. His commentary includes personal reflections and anecdotes from his personal, family and vocation history.

The hybrid class sessions will at 9 a.m., live in the first classroom upstairs and on the same Zoom ID as the Sunday worship service. The book is available on most online outlets for as little as \$5 and new on Amazon for \$12.99. For PC(USA) loyalists, the it is available new from the denomination’s online bookstore through the thoughtful Christian for now at \$14.30 (which is 35% off) plus \$10.50 shipping.

RENEWAL, RENEWAL, RENEWAL

We've been talking about renewal for years at FUPC. So, what's the big deal? What's a renewal? You may know that after a pastor has been at a Presbyterian church for six years, she/he can take a 3-month sabbatical/leave. Katie will take her leave this summer to visit the Wisconsin plains, the Oregon coast and the Colorado mountains and be inspired to write prose and poetry. Actually, Katie's leave was to have taken place in May-August of 2022, but was delayed when fires and floods wreaked havoc in our area, and Katie elected to put off the sabbatical to May-

August of 2023. This means time away from committees, sermon writing, worship service development, pastoral counseling and the many other duties Katie has. It's time for relaxation, rest, and writing in response to what she experiences in these settings; and to renew her energy and creativity. It's called clergy renewal.

But wait, what about the congregation, what about church services and activities? Well, that's called congregational renewal. It means experiencing different ways to learn about and respond to God in worship. It means looking at our connections to God, our world and each other through new lenses and perspectives.

FUPC is blessed with a congregation rich in talents, interests and expertise. A couple of years ago, such a group wrote a proposal to the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program, (yup, that's the Eli Lilly Company, a pharmaceuticals company based in Indianapolis, Indiana, with offices all over the world). The grant would pay for both Katie's time away, as well as what would happen here with the congregation/community in her absence. The total amount requested was \$49,822 and it was awarded to FUPC of Las Vegas!

Now that's serious renewal! You know what Katie and DR will be doing, but what are these new lenses, new perspectives, new experiences that the congregation/community will be invited to participate in? Well, first the name for all of this is *Tracking the Word: Embodying the Spirit*--the name of the grant proposal. While Katie is tracking the word on the plains, by the ocean and in the mountains; we'll be tracking the word right here with an amazing line-up of both lay and ordained preachers on Sunday mornings. We'll also be tracking the word with professional coaches who will guide and teach us in a fun array of workshops on Saturdays.

It all starts on Saturday, May 6, when John Stokes, Tracker, will lead two tracking workshops--on the Riverwalk from 1-3; and at FUPC from 3-5. On Sunday, Tracker Stokes will lead the worship service. On May 28 Sharon Van der Meer will lead worship by Tracking the Word through Journaling. Linda Solyntjes leads worship on June 4 with Tracking the Word through the Universal Language of Music.

June 10 & 11 Guest Jen Friedman, M.Div., Chaplain, and Leader of Dances of Universal Peace will lead a workshop at the Old Town Mission from 1-4 on Tracking the Word with dance. Sunday she'll incorporate universal dance into the worship service. Painter Duffy Peterson will paint to scripture on Sunday, June 18, while she shares what in the Word guided her brush strokes. The last weekend of June brings Saturday, June 24, with workshops from 1- 5 pm at FUPC on journaling, drama/acting, photography and poetry with Sharon Vander Meer, Caroline Rackley, Val Isenhower and Kayt Peck, respectively.

July brings choral music educator, Roger Holland, from Denver to share Tracking the Word through Spirituals. Rev. Linda Loving, HR, and actor brings Tracking the Word through acting. July workshops feature Tracking the Word workshops on Saturday July 22 with John Arnold and Tai Chi, Frank Buerskens and Woodworking, and Carol Litherland and American Sign Language.

August 12 & 13, Rev. Seth Finch, pastor at Albuquerque's Covenant Presbyterian, teaches us Tracking the Word through Storytelling. Steve Leger, trumpeter, and company will lead us in Tracking the Word with jazz on the Riverwalk Aug. 20. Workshops Saturday, August 26, feature Kevin Johnson tracking with crafts, Elizabeth Ratzlaff tracking with glass painting and Anne Bradford tracking with doodling/Zentangle. Judi Ruprecht, UWC dance instructor, leads worship Aug. 27 as we Track the Word with Movement; and Brett Gilland, lay preacher, leads worship Sept. 3. Katie returns to the pulpit on Sept. 10. Whew!

So, who can come and what does it cost? Everyone can come--all ages, from the FUPC family and the entire community. There is no cost. COME JOIN US!!

FUPC KITCHEN USE

Many folks use the kitchen. Sometimes they will make a snack or coffee for themselves or a small group. Sometimes it is a major cooking project, like the Samaritan House Cook Team every Friday. Sometimes it is a church volunteer on Sunday morning after the worship service. Sometimes it is an outsider, who is using our facility. (Some groups use our church for free, others will rent it. The Session, through the TT&T Committee, is in charge of these rentals.) We have a kitchen manual for the use of the kitchen. We also have written guidelines for groups that rent different parts of the church buildings.

With so many people involved, it is important that we all know the rules and duties. This will promote cleanliness and safety. Below is a summary of the kitchen rules. If you are going to be involved in any food service activity, even just picking up used dishes and cups after a fellowship time, please follow the rules. Thanks. General Information for Food Servers

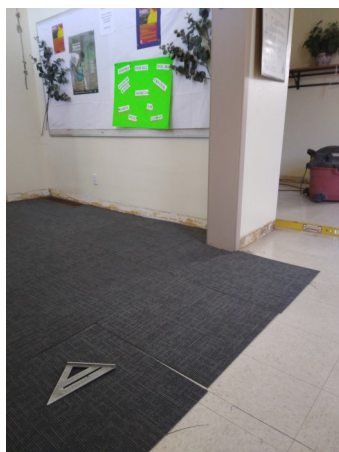
- Do not serve food if you are ill. Head colds, coughing, sneezing, or a recent diarrheal illness should disqualify you from food service duties. If you have a Band-Aid on your hand, wear a glove. Open sores on arms and hands should also prevent you from serving food or doing dishes.
- Wash your hands! Use the handwashing sink to the right of the refrigerator. Do not use the other sinks to wash hands.
- When the meal and related cleanup is done, wipe down the counter tops with the sanitizing spray cleaner. This needs to be followed with a plain water, damp cloth, wipe down.
- Do not use the sanitizing spray cleaner on the plastic table covers in Perea Hall. Use plain water or the standard household cleaning spray to wipe down the tables. If there is a major spill in the kitchen or in Perea Hall, sweep or mop if needed. Visible crumbs and food scraps must be swept up.
- Make sure the ovens and the burners are all turned off. The gas knobs should all be vertical to be completely off. (Do not adjust the main gas inlet valve on the left front corner of the stove. This should be left on.)
- Before leaving, check the stove again to be sure. Check the dishwasher: has it been drained and turned off?
- Check the freezer and the refrigerator: are the doors tightly closed? Did you clean the coffee makers? Are the coffee pots and hot water pot all turned off and unplugged?
- Put away pots, pans, dishes, and utensils when they are dry.
- Notify the church Office Manager or the Kitchen Coordinator if any supplies are low or post a note on the refrigerator door.
- Turn out the lights. Turn off the ceiling fans. Turn the thermostat down to 60 deg. When the last person is ready to leave, walk through the church to be sure there is no one remaining.
- Turn on the security alarm (the "Away" button.) Lock the door on your way out.

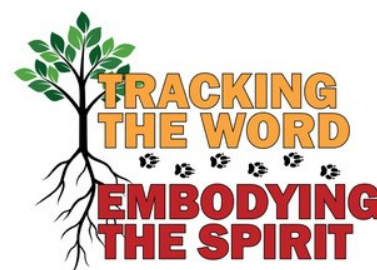

MUSTARD SEED AWARDS GIVEN TO 11 ORGANIZATIONS

For over 150 years, First United Presbyterian Church of Las Vegas has been planting seeds, taking root in the community, and branching out to make a difference. For 32 of those years the church has been giving nonprofits in the area funds for one-time only start-up projects through Mustard Seed grants. The grants range from \$200 to \$1,500 and add up to more than \$161,000 distributed to 180-plus organizations.

Awards for 2023 amounted to \$5600. Recipients include the 4-H Gardening Project NMSU Extension, N.M. Special Olympics adaptive equipment for athletes, Big Brothers Big Sisters Mora/San Miguel counties for a food training and cooking project, West Las Vegas High School Key Club youth shopping for HOPE clients, Las Vegas Lit Up from the Ashes book project, Aneata O'Brien art exhibit, Las Vegas Arts Council literature rack, Chad Brown Phoenix Rising community sculpture, Jamie Garcia rhythm workshop for youth, Las Vegas Jewish Community raised beds at Montefiore Synagogue, and Diane Lane strength training class for seniors.

A requirement of the grant award is for a representative of the recipient organization to give a presentation to the congregation about the project once it has been implemented or complete. We'll be looking forward to these presentations!

Mustard Seed committee members include co-chairs Corky Halverson and Carol Linder, Kevin Johnson, and Sharon Vander Meer.

TO JOIN ANY FUPC EVENTS VIA ZOOM

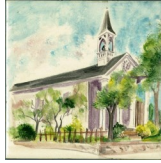
You are welcome and encouraged to worship in the sanctuary, but if you would like to continue worshipping online, here are the instructions to access Zoom:
