UPDATE FROM DEACONS

Pot Luck – All are invited to **potluck lunch** after the worship service on **Sunday, October 27th.** Please bring a dish (salad, hot dish, or dessert) to contribute. The Deacons will provide beverages. We are looking forward to enjoying the fellowship that sharing a meal can provide.

WHAT IS CIRCLE OF CARE?

Fear of falling is one of the biggest concerns for those who live alone. The secondary concern is that you will not be able to reach out for help because of an injury. Circle of Care reinforces our connection as a church family by pairing the vulnerable among us through daily contact by phone. If you can't be reached, your caller will phone an emergency contact that you designate who will have access to your home or be able to verify that you are safe.

If you wish to be a participant – as someone who would like to be called or as a caller – please contact Sharon Vander Meer or Bonnie Trujillo so you are included in the Circle of Care.

Sign up forms will be available following worship for the next few weeks. This is a means of getting needed information: phone number, backup plan if you can't be reached, and a preferred time to be called.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION UPDATE

In July of 2024 our food distribution team began to distribute TEFAP food, better known as Commodities along with our regular household food. TEFAP stands for "the emergency food assistance program". I definitely was not a willing participant, but I was reassured this would bring more food to our Community. TEFAP food is given to The Food Depot by the government and our regular household food is purchased or donated to the food depot. Our team leaders have had much paperwork and training in getting this commodity food to our community. Ten volunteers have taken Civil Rights training and are now qualified to register households. We have had a few bumps in the road with household families not wanting to give personal information. Some volunteers have been verbally abused by some individuals being upset with registration.

Crystal Western Ford (co-team leader), Mary Shaw (prepares our spreadsheet) and myself met with The Food Depot employees a couple of weeks ago to express our concerns. I will have to say our concerns were actually more than I am wanting to share. We expressed our concerns and our desire to withdraw from the commodity food. Unfortunately, we have been told that is not possible. If we are not a willing party with commodities, then The Food Depot will take the lead on our distribution. After our meeting, Crystal, Mary and myself decided we would continue with our leadership until January 2025 and at that point evaluate how this distribution is progressing.

We are still the biggest food distribution in the northeast region of our state distributing to an average of 430 households. Our volunteers do a fantastic job and always show up with a happy attitude. Rain or shine, snow, hail and wind we are there. It is taking between 18 and 22 volunteers to distribute the food brought in. Thanks again to our dedicated volunteers.

NEW CLASS SERIES: A SPIRITUALITY FOR THE TWO HALVES OF LIFE

The Sunday morning bible-based class for youth and adults will begin a new discussion series on October 20, based on the book *Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life* by Richard Rohr. The series will break for Advent and resume in January.

The publisher says "Most of us tend to think of the second half of life in chronological terms, but this book proposes a different paradigm. Spiritual maturity is found "when we begin to pay attention and seek integrity" through a shift from our "outer task" to the "inner task." What looks like falling down can be experienced as falling upward—and is not necessarily connected with aging. [Rohr] focuses on practical guidance that you can use to live a life of love and meaning in a world of suffering and challenge. Falling Upward is an invitation to living the gospel and a call to ongoing transformation. Readers may:

- "Gain a spiritual perspective on the "the common sequencing, staging, and direction of life's arc" and learn how to bring forth your gifts in the second half of life
- "Grapple with difficult feelings, fears, and emotions associated with "great love and great suffering" "Learn how we "grow spiritually much more by doing it wrong than by doing it right" Understand why so many of us resist falling into the second half of life."

Fr. Richard Rohr is a globally recognized ecumenical teacher bearing witness to the universal awakening within Christian mysticism and the Perennial Tradition. He is a Franciscan priest of the New Mexico Province and founder of the Center for Action and Contemplation. Rohr is author of numerous books, including Everything Belongs, Adam's Return, The Naked Now, Breathing Under Water, Immortal Diamond, and Eager to Love.

The class will discuss the first edition of this book, the 2011 hardbound edition (or its paperback printing) published by Jossey-Bass. (The Dust Jacket features two chairs and a table. Watch out not to buy the companion journal, which has the same cover.) This edition is available from Amazon in good condition for as little as \$2.18 plus shipping. \$1.19 from Alibris.com and \$5.09 from Abebooks.com. 

MISSION AND PEACEMAKING UPDATES

Your Mission and Peacemaking Committee has been busy.

We are grateful for all your generous gifts of your time, talents and treasure towards the mission and peacemaking efforts of our church. The Mission and Peacemaking Committee heads up many of these efforts and keeps tabs on all the rest. We have a lot of news for you. Please reach out to any of the M&P committee members if you would like more information or would like to get more involved in this work.

Mission & Peacemaking is delighted to let you know that FUPC is once again able to purchase the gift of a Garden Well for \$1500 from the Presbyterian Giving Catalog. We purchase this from the Presbyterian Catalog which typically most churches do around Christmas giving. So we have often referred to this project as Christmas in July. Thanks to all the gifts you have given. Think of the joy this will bring the community that receives it and let that warm your heart.

Thanks to all who contributed to this effort. Coming up is the PCUSA National Peace and Global Witness Offering, which supports mission co-workers around the world, as well as assistance to communities like ours who have suffered natural disasters like forest fires, floods and hurricanes through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA).

FUPC will once again participate in the *Angel Tree Project*, where individuals purchase a Christmas gift for a child who has a parent who is incarcerated. This year we have 21 Angel Tree Kids. For more information on this, see Pat Halverson.

Mustard Seed is now a subcommittee under M&P. We funded one project this past year, the Tri County Farmer's Market's Sprouting Smiles Kids Activity Days, and Arielle Hawney gave us a wonderful minute for mission presentation detailing the use of the funds and the impact they had on our community, particularly the youth who participated in the programming at the Farmers Market. You can donate anytime to Mustard Seed. There is a place for it on the giving part of our website. If you have an idea or know of someone who has an idea for a project that would benefit our community and needs funding, be sure to have them apply. We will be getting out guidelines for grant applications early in the year and review the applications and award grants in March. Awards are up to \$1500 and are startup grants for new projects.

Border ministry has long been a passion of this church. You may remember the youth of our church and LIFT students at Highlands travelling to El Paso/Juarez and Douglas/Agua Prieta to do mission work in those communities through Frontera de Cristo and Iglesia Luterana Cristo Rey. Our session last month designated \$500 gift to Cristo Rey after hearing the plight of their church needing to replace their roof and repair the electric system because of damage due to a severe storm August 30, 2024. With the help of us and many others they will be able to pay for the repairs as they get back to the important work they do serving migrants and providing border immersion experiences to spread awareness and understanding. We understand from social media posts from Rose Mary Sanchez-Guzman their pastora that they were able to return to having services in their church September 28th. HAPPY 40TH ANNIVERSARY FRONTERA DE CRISTO PRESBYTERIAN BORDER MINISTRY!

Frontera de Cristo, located in Douglas, Arizona, U.S. and in Agua Prieta, Sonora, MX, is celebrating its 40th Anniversary! Beginning 10:00 a.m. Friday, October 18th and continuing through Sunday the 20th after Worship on the Border, the weekend will be packed with feasting, Bible-study, presentations and discussions about migration and the drug culture led by experts from the PC(USA), the United Methodist Church and a professor of World Christianity from Baylor University. There will be tours of Mexican partner ministries of Frontera, listening to international choral music, dancing, worshiping and more feasting, to list a few of the planned activities. Meeting old and new friends and networking, of course, will be a major part of the event.

Frontera de Cristo has been a strong leader in border ministry since its beginning. At one time there were seven border ministries, four in Texas and two in Arizona and one in California. Because of many difficulties over the years, such as drops in funding, COVID, drug cartel activity and ecclesiastical differences between the Presbyterian Church of Mexico and the PC(USA), some ministries weakened and some disappeared. Today there are four remaining. Frontera de Cristo has managed to thrive, thank God, largely because of the dedication of the binational board and the strength of leadership from both sides of the border. Lack of drug cartel wars has helped, too.

FUPC has enjoyed a long friendship with Frontera de Cristo. Many adults and youth from here have spent time visiting the border ministry and learning firsthand about migration and the valuable partner programs it has developed on both sides of the border. The Café Justo economic justice project, which this church helped support with a Mustard Seed grant, has grown and developed its goal of "reverse migration". The "Café Justo y Mas" coffee shop in Agua Prieta, is also a great place to hang out and sip latte while surfing the net.

The Mexican Coordinator of Frontera is Rev. Jocabed Gallegos and the U.S. Coordinators are Rev. Mark Adams and Miriam Maldanado-Adams. Keep an eye on future newsletters for a possible report following the Anniversary.

Crystal Western Ford is Luna Community College's Luna Strong Coordinator

In July 2024 Crystal took on a new role at Luna Community College as their Luna Strong Coordinator. Her new full-time position that evolved out of a grant-funded part-time position Crystal started in March of 2023 on a grant from the NM Higher Education Department to promote college food security. Crystal completed her Community Health Worker certification this past year and has hit the ground running in her expanded role.

As the Luna Strong Coordinator, Crystal has the following responsibilities:



Provides holistic case management to address non-academic student needs, including food security, mental health, transportation, housing, and medical care.

Promotes access to and coordinates the Luna Strong Food Security program and other Luna Strong wellness services

Works with stakeholders to maintain basic needs options across campus and connect the campus community to basic needs resources available in Las Vegas and surrounding communities.

Collaborates with Community Health Worker instructors to provide experiential learning.

Crystal is still a vital part of our church family. She recently joined the Old Town Mission Community Joint Operating Team and also continues to work with Sharon Vander Meer on our newsletter.

VACCINATIONS AND PREVENTING ILLNESS

The Deacons exist to promote the well-being of our church family. At our last regular meeting, we decided to remind you all of something you each can do to stay healthy.


Get up to date and stay up to date with the CDC recommended vaccinations. It's not just for kids anymore! Keep a written record of your own personal vaccination history. Keep a small card in your wallet; your doctor or your pharmacist can give you one. You never know when you might need to remember your last injection.

Here are the CDC recommendations for most of our congregation's age group:

- Pneumococcal pneumonia vaccine: one time after age 65, or earlier if you have certain health conditions. (Pneumococcus is a bacteria that is the cause of common type of pneumonia.)
- RSV vaccine: one time after age 75, or earlier if you have certain health conditions. (RSV is Respiratory Syncytial Virus. It can cause lung infections at any age, but these tend to be more serious in young children and older adults.)
- Influenza: an annual flu vaccine in the Fall of each year. (The virus that causes the flu changes a bit each year, so the vaccine has to be changed annually to account for the 3 or 4 varieties that are expected to be the most common each flu season. You can still get the flu from one of the strains of flu virus that are not covered by the vaccine, but they are much less common. Even in those cases, the vaccine will help lessen the severity and duration of the illness.)
- COVID-19. It's called COVID-19 because the first cases were diagnosed in 2019. Similar to the influenza virus, the COVID virus changes slightly each year, so the vaccine needs to be updated every year or so. It's a good idea to be vaccinated with the most current and up to date vaccine, usually in the Fall of each year.
- Shingles. Caused by the chicken pox virus which has been incubating in your body since childhood, shingles is a very painful and debilitating illness which can persist for months. You don't want it! So, get a one time dose after age 50.
- Tetanus. You are probably used to getting a "tetanus" shot every 10 years or if you have an accidental cut. What you may not know is that the shot you actually have been getting for decades is actually a combination vaccine which includes both the vaccine against tetanus and also against diphtheria. This vaccine is called "Td".
- Pertussis (whooping cough). Usually a part of the usual childhood series of vaccinations, adults should also get a one-time booster. You can get it as a separate injection or it can be combined with the ten-year Td injection (in which case it is called Tdap, similar to what children get.) After ten years, you can then go back to the Td injection.

Some of these vaccines are a one-time injection. No need to repeat them. The others need to be repeated on a schedule as noted. For certain people, with special circumstances, other vaccines may be needed. What are "special circumstances" and "certain medical conditions"? Ask your doctor!
